




We are Forward Rabun.

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


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

MOUNTAIN LODGING in Rabun

There comes a time, no matter how exciting the day in Rabun County has been, when you simply have to call it quits. Whether you've spent your day on one of the lakes or hiking to enjoy the majestic views from one of many towering mountain peaks, come night, bedtime beckons. Browsing the region's many art galleries and shops can be both exhilarating and exhausting. Even if the most strenuous thing you've done has been to unwind from the pressures of everyday life back in the real world, tired bodies have to call it a day and recoup for the next day's agenda.

After a meal from one of many local dining options, it's time to lay yourself down to sleep. After all, the only thing better than one day in Rabun County is two or three, or even more. So where, and how, do you find those comfortable hours of restful Z's? After all, one person's idea of roughing it is another's definition of luxury.

Fortunately, when your destination is Rabun County, your biggest problem will be deciding which of the many lodging options is right for you. Are you planning to hike and fish? Perhaps one of the many campgrounds where you can pitch your tent is what you need. When you live close to nature, the first step of that hike can be right outside your door. Or perhaps your idea of roughing it is a little more sophisticated. Got a travel trailer, fifth wheel or motor home? Rabun County offers several options for your own personal staycation RV style, all with every comfort of home included, and some drop dead gorgeous scenery besides.

Motels have long been a traveler's mainstay and several different types of hostelries dot the Rabun landscape. Ranging from those that offer basic lodging, a good night's sleep that leads to a great launch for another unforgettable day in the Rabun hills, to those on the other end of the spectrum, where you'll find the specialty inns and bed & breakfast operations. These properties take pampering to great heights, ensuring that there's something here that satisfies your personal comfort expectations. Some of these are mountain properties, while others take advantage of the 100 miles of lakeshore found around the three lakes.

Probably nothing is more synonymous with the image of the mountains than a log cabin. While those early structures, such as those that populate the Foxfire museum campus were crude and basic at best, today's cabins have taken "mountain habitation" to new heights. They have all of the old world charm that built the cabin's reputation, but with all the new world's comforts.


And if just a night or two isn't sufficient to whet your appetite for a fantastic Rabun experience, consider a short-term rental for a longer stay. Talk about making yourself at home! The options are as varied as the individual properties themselves. Just take a gander at what awaits you when you choose to lay your head down in Rabun County.

There's plenty of room in the inns...

There's a certain aura, a certain expectation, when considering a stay at a bed and breakfast inn. When that inn's located in Rabun County, the possibilities are varied and enticing. Some inns are located in a strictly mountain setting, while others capture the lake ambience. Some are located along main highways, or in the center of town, close to restaurants and shops. Others are off the beaten path, where guests can watch grain being milled and then enjoy the quality, homemade baked goods that result.

Guest comfort is the watchword of all the local establishments. Whether it's oversize rooms, luxury bedding, thick fluffy towels and complimentary robes, deluxe showers, or the availability of WI-FI, the list of accouterments is long and varied, and highly prized by satisfied guests.

Some of these inns are the ultimate in southern antebellum architecture, where ornate moldings and quality, period wall coverings garnish the image of gracious hospitality and comfortable lodgings. Others,



while they don't lose sight of their mission to deliver hospitality and comfort ala carte, present a more rustic, more low-key curb appeal that appeals to a different style of traveler.

The specific offerings of each establishment and their own brands of presentation vary from inn to inn. Some serve only breakfast, and the guest takes lunch and dinner at one of Rabun's many and varied dining outlets. Other inns offer the option of an evening meal, while still others don't routinely prepare evening meals, but instead host special dining events that often include wine tastings and other special offerings.

Rabun County is famous for its farm-to-table food designation, meaning that area farmers and other agricultural operations sell much of their product to local eating establishments. Most of the inns that delight their guests with menu options ranging from scrambled eggs to Eggs Benedict, purchase their raw ingredients locally. In order to serve their guests in a manner guaranteed to tantalize their taste buds and make their stay memorable, they concentrate the

menu offerings around the harvest of local orchards, dairies, truck gardens, and other agricultural offerings. A number of inns purposely serve dishes created from organic and natural foodstuffs. Several working wineries are scattered throughout the county, and provide a basic wine offering for many of the inns.

But inns are more than comfortable beds and luxurious perks like gourmet dishes and award-winning wines. They're an opportunity to get away from all that tugs at your coat strings and allow you to be pampered. Inns are a chance to relax in rocking chairs overlooking unforgettable lakeside sunsets or mountain cove sunrises. Dine alfresco on screened-in porches or alongside warming winter fires, then curl up in comfortable, secluded niches and tackle that book that you can't put down. Gather in the great room to meet your fellow guests to partake of a social hour, enjoy a game of cards or perhaps work as a team to assemble a jigsaw puzzle. Some properties offer on-site gyms, while others cater to brides and their wedding parties. Still others have secluded cottages in addition to their guest rooms, and some even allow pets.

But Rabun's inns and their offerings aren't just indoor activities. They also work well as home base for many possibilities. From hiking to fishing to swimming, whitewater rafting, and boating to shopping and soaking up the talents of many mountain artists, check out the cooperative relationships that many inns have with other local outlets, all for the benefit of their guests.

Some Rabun inns are housed in structures that date back to the 1840s, but in any case, guests that make them their homes away from home agree on one thing: Rabun County inns are a hidden gem just waiting to be discovered!

In the market to rent a mountain cabin? Look no further!

Why are you coming to Rabun County? Looking for a fun, family vacation? Perhaps, your church or organization is holding a retreat? Maybe you're in search of a romantic get-away with that special someone in your life? And given the new popularity of destination weddings, there's no better location to exchange vows. Regardless of why your visiting here, one thing's for certain: everyone in your party needs a place to sleep, and the availability of cabins large and small are just waiting to welcome you. Most of these properties are available year-round, and are convenient to shopping and groceries.

Whether you're looking for a quaint, private set of accommodations for two, or you need sleeping space for twenty-two, the assortment of cabins and cottages gives you an excellent selection. Most come furnished with king and queen size beds. Many of the cabins are privately-owned by individuals who lease to the public, while others are part of the many inns scattered throughout the county. There are even rental condos available, if that's more your speed.

But it matters not who owns the property, but the quality of the accommodations available. From authentically restored antique log cabins that have been infused with all the twenty-first century creature comforts anyone could want to brand new construction, Rabun County is where you can find the perfect place for your particular need.

Got farming in your blood? There are cottages in Rabun County located on working farms, where guests can enjoy the ambience of the rural setting complete with livestock. Maybe a quasi-tree house floats your boat. Are you a railroad buff? How does spending the night in a refurbished train car sound? Or can you remember the 1950s? Get your name on the list early enough, and a small 50's era travel trailer can be your home away from home. And for entertainment, there's a drive-in movie, another nod toward the past, right outside your door.

There's also trout fishing, hiking, water-sports, sightseeing, shopping, artist studios and galleries, canoeing, biking and horseback riding, and white water rafting, plus too many different dining opportunities to count right outside that same door. But if your idea of a fantastic time is staying in for a quiet, private dinner, most cabins and cottages have fully-equipped kitchens capable of turning out a full meal. In addition to the invigorating mountain breezes, cottages have air conditioning and heating, and many boast of a fireplace. Still others are handicapped accessible, and some even have hot tubs and swimming pools.

Since WI-FI and a TV signal are available as well, you don't have to sacrifice all contact with the outside world. Unless you want to, that is. It's your call, but there's no better place than Rabun County to divorce yourself from technology and the rat-race. And if you need to bring your four-legged family members along, many cabins are pet-friendly. After all, it's not a vacation without every single family member!

You haven't lived until you've kicked back on the rocking chair porches that are almost regulation on the county's many rental cabins. How about resting in the porch swing or spending an afternoon in a hammock? After all, relaxation is why you came to the mountains in the first place. Right? So chill out., recharge. Limber up, rev up your engines, then engage in a spirited game of bocce ball, corn hole or even badminton, before you gather around a fire pit or a grill to finish off the evening.

Whether they're located in the north end of the county, or in the south, many of the cabins abut National Forest lands. And with forests, come waterfalls and the possibility of animals of the forest as neighbors, which can make for great photo opportunities – from afar, of course!

The word "camping" conjures up images of people



relaxing around a campfire, the sun is dropping in the western sky, and the smell of meat cooking permeates the pristine outdoor breezes. In the background, tents stand ready to welcome weary residents for a night of rest.



Lake living welcomes you to a riparian lifestyle Rabun style

The word "riparian" applies to lakeside locations and activities, and in Rabun County where three large, recreational lakes provide over 3,800 acres of water and 100 miles of shoreline, the opportunities for riparian enjoyment make a big splash with visitors and locals alike.

Not everyone can be fortunate enough to own "a place on the lake," but that doesn't mean the door is forever closed to a chance to experience that highly touted lake living lifestyle. Even if it's only for a short period of time, thanks to lake house rentals and boat ramps, anyone can be a riparian baron for a few days. There's nothing quite like spending a night with the water right outside your window. And in Rabun County, the water's fine for living and sleeping. You have to experience it to truly know what you've been missing.

Need convenient, comfortable, affordable lodging? Rabun's got it!

Roadside motels have long been a friend of the traveling public. With their comfortable beds and locations convenient to food, entertainment, recreation and sight-seeing, these temporary homes away from home have long catered to Rabun visitors. 
Resorts cater to royalty of all descriptions

The Mourtains are Calling ... by Deena C. Bouknight

Everywhere there are stickers, t-shirts, and hats with the logo, "The mountains are calling, and I must go." Many residents of the Appalachian and surrounding mountains harken from distant places, but they heeded that call and are now ensconced in the landscape. Others cannot wait to visit seasonally or at least annually. Not surprisingly, this draw to the majestic vistas, stunning waterfalls, lush vegetation, and pristine air is historic. Explorer, botanist, and naturalist William Bartram traversed the area in the 1700s on foot, by horseback, and by canoe and then he wrote about it in beautiful, descriptive prose [The Travels of William Bartram] that piqued the imagination of people not only in America, but in Europe as well.

Once the Native American trails, which became wagon trails, opened up to become actual roads, visitors flocked - and continue to flock - to the region. They are inspired by a "sense of place" that 19th century author Henry David Thoreau defined as "tapping into senses." The smells, tastes, sounds, and especially sights, are unforgettable.

Following is an experience guide, so that anyone can delve into and enjoy all that this distinct, natural region has to offer.


Equine Enjoyment

The Dillard House, in operation for more 100 years, is a prominent icon near the Georgia/North Carolina border. People stop and stroll, visit animals in the petting zoo, and dine family-style at large tables filled with hearty farm-to-table selections. But people also stay in the various accommodation selections and enjoy the amenities - including horseback riding offered at the Dillard House Stables.

Equestrian Pam Thompson goes way back in association with the Dillard House. While not as far back as when the stables first offered rides at 50 cents per ride, she has owned and operated the stable portion of The Dillard House since 1989.

"I grew up riding and showing horses, with my first







horse show being at age 6," explained Thompson. "In the early 1980s, I was given the opportunity to operate the stables at Sky Valley, where we took trail rides to the top of what was then known as Thomas Knob. I also taught horseback riding to many local children. During my time there, John and Louise Dillard brought their young daughter, Natalie, for lessons, and I guess you could call that 'the beginning'! When John bought The Dillard House from family members, he approached me about joining efforts to provide a top-notch horseback operation."

Because she wants guests and visitors to enjoy the most from their horseback riding experience at The Dillard House, Thompson has continued to study good horsemanship practices, which she shares with the stables' employees. She also personally shows horses in such equine classes as English, western pleasure, halter, barrel racing, and a skill referred to as "cutting."

Thompson's stable includes 30-35 quarter horse or quarter horse mixes, "with the goal being 20 guest horses and others in training to become guest horses," she said.

Participants, no matter the skill level, can embark on 30-minute, one-hour, or one-and-a-half hour walking trail rides through a river and past beautiful mountain scenery or by vast scenes of idyllic farms. Guides are provided for every four participants. Thompson said safety is the number-one focus on all horseback rides.

"We have people come back year after year ... generations actually! And after being there this long, I see adults, even grandparents, who rode with us and are now bringing their grandchildren to ride."

Thompson added: "I take pride in the quality of horses I am able to share with



our guests at The Dillard House, and watching a group head out on the trail on really nice horses gives me great pleasure. Plus, I truly enjoy meeting and learning about the people who come ride with us – where they are from, what brought them here, what they do for a living and, of course, their stories of their first ride on a horse, or even the anticipation of taking their first ride with us."

To stay current regarding the desires and needs of residents and visitors to the area in terms of activities, etc., Thompson serves on the Dillard Tourism Association board as well as the newly formed Forward Rabun board.


Action-packed All-Ages Activities

The roadway or "strip" along Dillard Road (also referred to as Scaly Mountain Road) is considered by some people to be the "plateau playground." Highlands Outpost (formerly Scaly Mountain Outdoor Center) provides much of the excitement and entertainment available in that area. Jason Sawin, manager, explained that the Center offers snow tubing and ice skating in winter; trout fishing and gem mining during warm weather months; a newly renovated restaurant; and, this fall, the muchanticipated Wiegand Mountain Coaster (a.k.a. Scaly Screamer) that will be open year-round.

Sawin shared the Center's history: "Originally it opened as Ski Scaly in the 1980s, and in the summer the property served as the owner's cabbage patch. It was definitely a down-home version of a ski slope. And, when it became difficult to keep enough snow to provide skiing, it was turned into a tubing hill." He added, "The tubing aspect took off; people have so much fun on the hill!"

Eventually, Scaly "evolved over time" to provide all the activities currently available to visitors. "The property is large enough to offer more - especially in the summer," said Sawin. "That's why the idea of the mountain coaster was considered." Ground-breaking on the German-made coaster began this summer. The goal is for it to be up and running, and to run year-round, by the end of October 2021.

"It is an aesthetically pleasing, stainless steel coaster," said Sawin, ... distinct, and built on the side of the mountain so it's mostly gravity powered."



Instead of the experience of regular roller coasters, participants in an alpine coaster sit upright in sled-like carts that can accommodate 1 or 2 riders. Each cart has a hand brake to slow it down or speed it up. In other words, the participant controls the ride. The Scaly Screamer ride, according to Sawin, lasts an average of six minutes. "We expect it to be a great addition to the Center," he said.

Sawin, whose career history is in the recreational industry, believes this region is ideal for people who want to be outdoors in the natural environment, get fresh air, and, sometimes, participate in something thrilling. "The Center provides all those elements. The mountain coaster is a way to get into nature. The forest encloses it like a tunnel, so people will see and experience things they wouldn't normally see and experience while on the ground. And it's not so fast that everything will just be a blur."

The best part of his job? "I love hearing the laughter of families having a blast and enjoying the outdoors! The Center is fun for everyone, whether they are on vacation or they live locally and are looking for great family-friendly activities."

Kurt Damron, CEO of Highlands Aerial Park (HAP), which has been in business since October of 2012, explained that the concept for HAP came to fruition due to George and Karen Powell ziplining in Costa Rica and falling in love with the activity.

"Their wheels started turning and they realized that the lay of the land at their then-vacation property in Scaly Mountain would make the perfect spot for an aerial adventure park," informed Damron. "After visiting a few other parks and choosing a builder, construction began. It took approximately six months to build the park. One of the primary goals when building the park was to be as minimally invasive as possible, so very few trees were cut down."

HAP covers an expanse of over 90 acres of the area's temperate rainforest atop High Holly Mountain, which is the western-most mountain on the Highland's plateau.

Damron noted that interested individuals can consider various "tours," such as "The Full Mountaintop Zipline Tour," HAP's premium ziplining experience, that includes 17 unique aerial elements, such as the 1,550-foot (equivalent to five football fields) long; or, "Squealing Mare Zipline" that "flies individuals between two

mountain peaks." Another, "Half Mountaintop Zipline Tour," eases in the adventurer to the experience of ziplining. And, "The Brave Indian" is designed for "little adventurers" and families.

There is also the "Giant Mountain Swing," described as "your backyard swing on steroids." Damron further explained, "Nestled amongst sky-high pines, our triple-seater suspends one-to-three brave adventurers from the treetops for a rush you haven't felt since your first trip to the playground. We pull you four stories high, then one member of your trio pulls the ripcord — dropping you into an exhilarating, 80-foot arc through the trees."

Those who prefer to stay grounded can enjoy hikes to waterways and waterfalls. A self-guided walk of gradual descent leads to the headwaters of the springfed High Holly Creek. Damron describes the beauty of the excursion: "At the upper headwaters, the ground trail transitions onto a static bog bridge, which also serves as an observation platform for the Brave Indian course. This bridge was designed to preserve the delicate ecology of the springs, flora, and fauna below. Along the bridge, you can observe an impressive collection of massive boulder formations, which must certainly house hibernating black bears through the winter. The bridges lead to a century-old trail carved into the mountainside, which proceeds down a gentle slope for several hundred yards. Moss-covered rock formations are exposed, and native plant life abounds."

He added, "The nature trail continues along to a 150 ft. suspended bridge spanning the creek, engineered to eliminate the mountain contour's steep descent and subsequent climb, leaving only a minimal ascent on the nature trail to return to a nearly-level hike in a verdant, rain-forest environment. Along the nature trail tour, informational markers identify the native species abundant in the region. [Participants can keep their] eye out for the double-trunk poplar, one of many centuries-old giants in this area ... follow the sounds of bubbling waters to locate hidden falls and springs along the creek. And keep an eye to the sky for screaming Zipline Canopy Tour fliers as their course occasionally traverses overhead."

Prices at HAP vary, from around \$24 to just under \$100. And Damron pointed out that safety is "our primary concern," stating, "We have one of the most stringent and thorough training programs in the aerial adventure industry. Training a new facilitator takes approximately





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two full weeks. After training, trainees enter into a period of shadowing and being shadowed before being fully cleared to guide. Every HAP employee is certified in both CPR and first aid and undergoes recertification training on an annual basis. HAP is also inspected by third-party Preferred Vendor Members, who are accredited to design, build, inspect, and train aerial adventure courses on an annual basis. Statistically speaking, it also happens to be one of the safest outdoor sports in existence."

Damron said that while many people - adults and children - might make ziplining a regular, or at least annual, activity, others desire to check it off their bucket list. He implored, "Who doesn't want to fly like an eagle above the treetops at 210 feet off the ground? Who doesn't want to experience the beauty of the temperate rain forest for two hours high above the ground? It is truly one of the most freeing and exhilarating experiences you can have. HAP has had guests as old as 96 complete their entire zipline canopy tour!"

Communing with Nature

For centuries, people of all ages have reveled in the serenity of the area's natural beauty and wildlife and enjoyed less heart-pounding pursuits as fishing, gem mining, painting, photography, etc.

Otto, North Carolina-based Andy's Trout Farm has become an iconic go-to in the region, serving multigenerations of families. The trout farm was opened in 1965, and gem mining was added about 15 years ago.

"My grandparents, Andy and Hazel Cope, started the farm in 1965," said Sonya Cousineau, "and my husband (Troy) and myself have been here 34 years. We of course have fishing, with people paying by the pound for the fish they catch. But we also offer gem mining, hiking, cabins, and camping. We rent fishing poles and sell bait, and we will clean the trout for a fee."

Cousineau said that she thinks people living in and visiting the North Georgia and Western North Carolina areas are drawn to fishing and gem mining because "these are both excellent outdoor activities and can be enjoyed by all ages, and with both, you leave with something tangible."

She and her husband have been involved in the family business for 56 years and never tire of seeing the enjoyment, meeting generations of families, and knowing memories are being made.

"We have made wonderful friends over the years and consider ourselves truly blessed," she said.

Clayton, Georgia's Reeves Outdoors manager Trey McFalls and his staff assist daily, and year-round, people who desire to fly fish. "People come in and talk to us about where they can fish and what kind of flies to use where. We can, and do, complete set ups with everything they need in whatever price point," said McFalls.

Currently, Reeves is exploring future opportunities to offer fly fishing lessons. Many individuals who patronize Reeves are already avid fly fishermen, but McFalls said there are misconceptions regarding fly fishing. "A lot of people think it's just long beautiful casting. But a lot of it is shorter casting and roll casting. It depends on the person and where they are fishing. There is a lot that goes into it – reading the water, the fly selection, brush, tree overhangs, etc."

Even though the film, A River Runs Through It, is almost 30 years old, McFalls said many fly fisherman who peruse Reeves mention they have seen it and were inspired by it.







The 20-year-old McFalls said he has been fishing "since I could walk in a river." He credits various local fishing opportunities for supporting his passion – and that of others. "Within a 50-mile range in Georgia and North Carolina, there are almost limitless opportunities ... a lot of water. There are rivers, lakes, and streams. A couple places more in-tune to fly fisherman are the Chattooga and Nantahala rivers. That's why we have a fly shop here – to sustain fly fishermen. Some bass fisherman also shop here, but mostly trout fishermen."

Reeves also sells materials for creating/tying flies, and it sells fishing licenses.

Less activity-oriented, but no less nature focused, avid outdoor lovers Broderick and Michele Crawford are in the business of capturing – through paintings and photography – such natural imagery as trout, birds, and other wildlife. Since 1995, the Crawford Art Gallery on Main Street in Clayton has featured their works and those of other artisans including wood turners, carvers, sculptors, potters, and more.

Broderick is a Rabun County native, who often paints anything that reflects the natural, historical, cultural, and traditional life of the mountains. Along with painting, he is also an award-winning carver, and he especially enjoys carving all species of waterfowl, shore birds, and song birds.

Michele Broderick is a fine art nature and wildlife photographer who captures distinct images through her lens and then shares them through the gallery.

Rapid Journey

Life literally imitated – or followed – art when Southeastern Expeditions was formed in 1972 because rafting equipment was purchased from Warner Brothers following the filming of the movie Deliverance in Rabun County. Claude Terry, the founder of Southeastern Expeditions, was even used as a consultant and stunt double in the movie, which starred Burt Reynolds, Jon Voight, and Ned Beatty.

Southeastern Expeditions, located in Clayton, offers Section III white water rafting on the Chattooga River for

beginning white water rafters, groups, and families, with the minimum age at eight years old. A Section IV excursion is for ages twelve years old and up. There are various packages and price ranges to choose from, including an option for an overnighter rafting trip.

Safety on the river is key, no matter what the thrill level. Southeastern's Chattooga River guides have a minimum of basic CPR and first aid, and many also have advanced first aid training. Plus, the rafting guides have extensive river training, and kayak instructors are considered experts in their fields.

Guides are adept at answering questions, allaying fears, and even serving to provide participants with the area's history and the river's distinct features.

Southeastern Expeditions will also work with participants to add into a full adventure experience assistance in choosing area hiking, biking, camping, etc. opportunities.

Gorgeous Golfing Opportunities

One of the main reason golfers seek courses in the North Georgia region is because of the views.

The Rabun County-owned course, originally built in the 1940s, is perched on a hillside under the shadow of Tiger Mountain. The small but challenging course allows for an 18-hole round of play with picturesque scenes aplenty. Besides regular tee times, there are occasional competitions and tournaments in which locals and visitors can be involved.

At elevation 3,500 feet, the 50-yearold Sky Valley golf course capitalizes on its mountain setting. Providing par 36-36-72 play, the course was originally designed by course architect Bill Watts, who used the natural









features to present beautiful vistas. In addition, a major renovation occurred in 2007 involving course designer, Bill Bergin; at that time Sky Valley was transformed into a championship course. In fact, Bergin was able to utilize previously unused parcels of land to lengthen the course by 500 yards. The current length is over 6,900 yards, which allows for each hole to have seven sets of tees providing distances for every level of player.

The semi-private Sky Valley Country Club course, meaning it is open for members, guests, and the general public, has a golf learning center that includes a practice range and a large putting green. Instruction is available from PGA Professional and Golf Manager Steve Heher. Plus, the facility offers a driving range, target greens, grass, all weather tees, and putting and chipping greens. In addition, lessons are available, utilizing "a state of the art Full Swing Golf Simulator".

Kingwood Resort and Winery in Clayton has a par 71 mountain golf course for all skill levels, due to its four

different tee locations. The playing yardage is 6,016 yards, which is a demanding length given the small greens and layout, and anyone interested in the course can take a video course tour on the Kingwood website in order to get a more in-depth look at all 18 holes.

Delighting in State Parks

Kim Hatcher, public affairs coordinator, State Parks and Historic Sites Division, noted that for centuries the north Georgia mountains have drawn tourists "to enjoy gorgeous scenery and thundering waterfalls."

She explained further, "Georgia's State Parks offer such a wide variety of activities. We have a new statewide geocaching program, which is like a treasure hunt that you can do with a smartphone. Kids can earn Junior Ranger badges at 59 sites. Hikers can join the Canyon Climbers Club, which challenges them to explore Tallulah Gorge, Amicalola Falls, Cloudland Canyon, and Providence



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Canyon. Most parks have picnic shelters that can be rented for family reunions, birthday parties, and weddings. I encourage people to spend some time on GaStateParks.org because they might be surprised by how much we offer."

Not including 2020's unusual circumstances, some of the local state parks draw thousands of guests annually. For example Black Rock Mountain averages 119,000; Moccasin Creek 85,000; and Tallulah Gorge 450,000.

"The museum at Tallulah Gorge State Park even has photos of ladies in Victorian dresses enjoying picnics along the canyon's edge and down near the rushing river," said Hatcher. "And, since Black Rock Mountain is at 3,640 feet above sea level, it's cooler than much of Georgia, making it a cooler destination spot during summer."

With participation in Georgia's state parks – or any state or national park for that matter – comes responsibility and respect. "We rely on Georgia's citizens and our visitors to help protect the parks for future generations, just like those tourists during the 1800s," implored Hatcher. "By staying on trails, you can protect the landscape. Joining Friends of Georgia State Parks and Historic Sites helps us with projects like outdoor classrooms. Our campground hosts are crucial volunteers, often serving as the first people you meet when you come camping."

While spring, summer, and fall months are when most people think of perusing and enjoying state parks, most are open year-round. The only consideration when weather turns chilly or downright cold, is that visitors are prepared. Said Hatcher, "During winter, it's especially important to be prepared for changes in weather. Hikers should always bring rain gear and dress in layers. For example, because Black Rock Mountain is at the top of a steep and winding road, visitors should check to make sure it's still open if there's been ice or snow."

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
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

Truett Cathy once said, "Food is essential to life, therefore make it good." You can read that quote in our little mountain town's Chick-fil-A. I bet you love food. I bet you eat food. I'd even go out on a limb and say you enjoy food with people you like. Since the summer of 2018, we've had the regular pleasure of telling a certain group of people our restaurant suggestions. We own a very busy and booked Airbnb log cabin, My Mountain Escape.

Two frequent questions our guests ask are: What's fun to do in the mountains? and Where's a good place to eat? If you know me, you know we're a family of adrenaline junkies, outdoor crazies. So recommending fun things to do like trail running, rock climbing, mountain biking and waterfall exploring are easy targets. Something else that's as easy as Joel's pancakes at the Rusty Bike, is telling folks where to eat. Atlanta transplants can sometimes murmur that there aren't a lot of restaurants here. I say 'nay' like a horse eating oats. Consider just how small our community actually is. Then consider how many great restaurants we have in such a tiny area.

I'd like to tell you about my absolute favorites. I'm no chef like my son-in-law Bret. But I do know the





two ingredients which make restaurants successful: really good food and a vibe to go with it. The vibe is created by great servers and an alluring atmosphere. First on the list is 'mi casa afuera de mi casa', my home away from home...Manriques. Best real Mexican food anywhere. Period. Mountain bikers and kayakers alike have this place pin dropped on their cellular devices.

The Rusty Bike doesn't need anymore business. If Joel's breakfast attracts anymore people, a sheriff deputy will need to control traffic into his place. There's a bicycle bell mounted by the front door. Please ring it a lot as you leave. You're welcome, Mr. Johnson. (Actually, folks may come to see Megan.)

Mama G's is an Italian restaurant where the owners treat you like family. I'm convinced there's a portly Sicilian grandfather cooking and singing loudly in the kitchen. He's there. I know it. You see Paul Gaglio Sr., the restaurant's founder and his Sicilian bride Krystyna founded this popular eatery. His spirit and her influence remain evident. I've gone looking for him. Maybe he hides behind a huge pot of simmering spaghetti sauce. Paul Jr. and his wife, Erin, have continued what began and the love their craft can be seen in every plate that comes out of the kitchen. The restaurants popular tagline is true... "Love is good food".

Fortify Pi and Fortify are both 'must visit' places. Award winning chef Jamie Alred and restaurant offianto Jack Nolan have created true farm to table dining. Their outstanding menu features an impressive ingredient list of local resources. The atmosphere of Fortify Pi, a gourmet pizza place is fun and you feel as if pizza might be healthy. The original Fortify is upscale and worth every penny.

The Lake Rabun Hotel, the Beechwood Inn, Rabun Manor and Julep Farms offer upscale and innovative fine dining in addition to their unique accommodations. And if you want your gourmet to go, head over to the Farmhouse Market at Lake Burton to give Chef

Scafiti's take-out creations a try.

A year ago, Lee and her husband Jim launched the Blue Canoe. Their "indoor/outdoorlive-music-nestled-on-thebackside-of-Burton" lake vibe is fun. Their Cajun/French Creole food is over the top. They are thriving!

Fromage and other fine foods offers indoor and porch dining. Their food is fresh and thoughtfully prepared. Best chicken salad ever! Chef Jenny Wilson opened the restaurant in 2007 and has been a favorite of many for going on 15 years.

Grapes and Beans deserve your attention too. "Groovy Food" is their mantra and they do it well. They easily accommodate Vegan and vegetarian diners and there is plenty on the menu for those who eat gluten-free. The atmosphere is as groovy as the food. You'll love it.

Up in Dillard, there is the Valley Café, the Cupboard Café and of course, the world-famous Dillard House. All serve up true southern cuisine, great

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
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


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Rabun County: Award Winning Whiskies and Award Winning Wines

When it comes to fermentation and distillation, Rabun County is a go-to destination. First, let's talk about the distilleries. Rabun County has two, and both produce award winning products. Up in Dillard, right next to the fabled Dillard House restaurant, you'll find the R. M. Rose Distillery. Before the Civil War, R. M. Rose was a nationally recognized whiskey maker, one of the finest in the land, but when prohibition came, their doors were shuttered and once alcohol was legalized again, the family had moved on to other enterprises. The folks in Dillard have revived the name and are dedicated to producing a nice line of bourbons and flavored whiskeys. My personal favorite is a cinnamon whiskey called "Fire on the Mountain". Yummy! The R. M. Rose Distillery has been honored with national awards. Stop by and see Melissa or Jeffie for a tour and tasting. And check their website for upcoming events at www.rmroseco.com.







Just south of Clayton on Hwy 441 is the Moonrise Distillery, run by Doug Nassaur and his wife Jen. Doug is a master distiller and he has numerous awards to prove it. Moonrise was recently named the top distillery in Georgia by Tasting Panel Magazine. Moonrise started out just making whiskey but has since expanded their product line to include Gin, Vodka, Rye Whiskey and an amazing Peach Brandy. They also feature a cream liqueur called Bourbon Snow Cream that's better than Bailey's if you ask me. They also offer craft cocktails, jellies and preserves, as well as



a bourbon based barbeque sauce. Oh, let's not forget ice cream and pickles. Moonrise has a nice sit down bar in their tasting room which has become the place to be on Sunday afternoons. They always have live music on Sundays. Check their website about scheduling a distillery tour. Both R. M. Rose and Moonrise sell their products on site and feature gift shops which are great places to pick up a gift or a souvenir.

So we sipped some whiskey, smooth and fine, now let's try some award winning wine. Rabun County boasts four wonderful wineries, from one



corner of the county to the other. On the northern end, just down the road from the R. M. Rose Distillery is Twelve Spies Vineyard. The vineyard's name came from the Bible and tells the story of Moses sending 12 spies to investigate the Promised Land. While there, they discovered grapes so large that it took 2 men just to carry one cluster. Founded by Mike Brown in 2012, Twelve Spies has flourished. They started with just a tasting room but soon added a "Vino Veranda" where patrons could enjoy their wine while looking out over the vineyards and the distant mountains. On weekends they often have live music on the veranda as well. 12 Spies features a broad selection of wines, whites and reds, sweet and dry. One of their new additions is a lovely Pinot Noir which I tried on my last visit, along with a small cheese and charcuterie pack, also available in the tasting room. I enjoyed it so much I bought a bottle. Meg and Donna are the lovely ladies in the tasting room, friendly and very wine knowledgeable. Tell them I sent you please. www.12spiesvineyards.com






On the other side of the county County's Rabun newest member of the vineyard family, Terra Incognita Vineyards. Terra Incognita features a beautiful, open air tasting room overlooking their beautiful vineyard. They have a nice variety of wines to choose from: a white, a rose', a couple of reds and a sparkling They also muscadine wine. have snack packs to compliment their wine. Terra Incognita is a sprawling property, so large that they have hiking trails and primitive camping spots. (Ask for a map if you're interested.) It's a bit of a drive but well worth it once you get there. Check their website to get directions and learn about special events.

Up next we visit Stonewall Creek Vineyards, just outside of Tiger, Georgia. Like many vineyards, Stonewall Creek was a hobby that became a passion that became a business. And quite a business it is, with countless awards, both regional and national, to prove it. The vineyard features a broad spectrum of wines: whites, reds, a rose' and an amber. Amber? Interesting. I haven't tried it but I plan to on my next visit. They also have a port styled dessert wine called Red Velvet, fortified with American brandy from Moonrise Distillery. And like our other Rabun County vineyards, Stonewall Creek is a stunning place to sit and enjoy some wine. You really need to see it in person. These are fun folks with fine wines.

Now we come to Tiger Mountain Vineyards, Rabun County's oldest winemakers. Located in the shadow of Tiger Mountain, the vineyard was started in 1995 by the late Dr. John Ezzard on land that had been in the family for generations. John's daughter, Lisa Ezzard, is now the winemaker and torch bearer of this family tradition. Tiger Mountain Vineyards has been winning awards for decades, making people from all over sit up and take

notice that these Georgia mountains are winemaking country. Tiger Mountain features eleven different wines, all selected to prosper in Georgia soil. Their newest release is a blended red called Fearful Symmetry, a name taken from a poem by William Blake. Besides their well appointed tasting room, Tiger mountain also has an onsite restaurant called the Red Barn Cafe', located in, you guessed it, a red barn. Chef Leon Lemoine is there on Saturdays cooking up sumptuous meals that pair perfectly with Tiger Mountain Wine. And most Saturdays feature live jazz music to make your vineyard experience even more enjoyable. Find out more on their website. - www.tigerwine.com

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Waterfalling with Mark Ozboyd

Suppose I asked you to recall a few outdoor activities. What comes to mind? Rock climbing, kayaking, perhaps just plain hiking. But in Georgia, a new outdoor pursuit is rapidly taking hold: waterfalling. Waterfallers are a unique sub segment of the outdoors community. They love spending time in nature just like the rest of us, but what sets waterfallers apart is they hike to waterfall after waterfall, and nowhere else. Traditionally, Georgia has not been known for grandiose waterfalls in the same sense as its neighbors, Tennessee and North Carolina. Nevertheless, an amazing 700 waterfalls are now documented in Georgia - including over 120 in just Rabun County alone. And of course, the waterfall obsession is not limited to waterfallers. Georgia's waterfalls are excellent destinations for anyone ranging from veteran hikers to Atlanta families who have never been exposed to the treasures of nature.

People can seldom point a finger to precisely what singles out waterfalls as such attractive destinations. Waterfalls are located in exquisite natural settings, often surrounded by unique and rare plants, wildlife, and geology. The dramatic energy of waterfalls is one of the best showings of nature's majestic forces, similar to the magnificent music of Beethoven's symphonies and piano sonatas. When I stand at a waterfall, I forget about all my everyday worries and always leave with a mind refreshed by the spray, breeze, and flowing water. It doesn't matter whether the waterfall is a thunderous free-fall or a subtle stairstep cascade. There's always something to see.


The first time I ever laid eyes upon a waterfall, I had the advantage of a birds-eye vantage point: my father's back. It was Amicalola Falls, and that is how I became enamored with waterfalls from the age of one. Ask any kid about how they spend their play time – most will tell you about see-saws and merry-go-rounds, or worse yet, about their favorite video game. I'm thankful that my version of the toddler playground consisted largely of Georgia State Parks, because they changed my life forever. The lessons and memories that children can make from nature are invaluable and lifelong.

Seven years ago, when I was 13, I established my first website, www.hikingtheappalachians.com. I wanted to share descriptions of my weekly nature explanations and help prevent others from getting lost on little-used trails. In the summer of 2018, I founded the Southeast Nature Society to coordinate a broader range of resources, as well as encourage people from all backgrounds and ages to connect with and conserve nature. Over the last few years, I learned about dozens of Georgia waterfalls missing from print books and hiking websites. An important caveat: it would be silly to suggest that any Georgia waterfalls were left unnoticed by fishermen, hunters, and loggers from ages past. Nevertheless, even in the digital age, many waterfalls have become lost in time due to their remote wilderness locations or lack of established access points. Thus, as the Southeast Nature Society's major debut project, I felt compelled to establish Georgia's first comprehensive waterfall database at www.gawaterfalls.com to bring the state's countless little-known waterfalls back to life. How long could people keep blindly flocking to Raven Cliff Falls and Panther Creek Falls when there's so much more to see?

No person has single-handedly inspired me more than Bernie Boyer. Five years ago, I stumbled upon Bernie's inconspicuous SmugMug webpage on the eighth page of Google's search results, and my jaw dropped at all the Georgia waterfalls I had no idea about. Given his age of 85, I'm now proud to call Bernie my oldest friend. A retired physicist, Bernie has amazingly been rediscovering waterfalls every week since he moved to Georgia in 2015. My database would have been twice smaller if not for the work of Bernie, as well as Georgia's other top waterfaller, pastor Greg Ford. Greg appears to spend every minute of his free time scouring maps for the next new waterfall, and I'm convinced he can stare at maps for ten hours straight. Together, these two men have uncovered Georgia's newest gold mine: a gold mine filled with dozens of undocumented waterfalls.

Consider the Lake Russell Wildlife Management Area in Rabun's next-door neighbor, Habersham County. Until









2017, most people in the outdoors community, myself included, knew about just one waterfall in LRWMA: Nancytown Falls, a 25-foot low-flow cascade hardly visible behind a rock jumble. You could wallow through a monsoon to Nancytown Falls and still leave so underwhelmed that you might reconsider the notion of "a bad day in the woods is better than a good day in the office". So why had this been the only 'known' waterfall in LRW-MA? Some ingenious ranger at the Forest Service must have surmised this was just the waterfall to construct an official trail to. Maybe they thought it would be a clever prank on unassuming visitors. Anyhow, the moral of the story is that today, we're aware of over twenty significant waterfalls in LRWMA. The region now attracts numerous waterfall seekers from metro Atlanta who don't wish to drive so far as Clayton.

If that isn't enough inspiration yet, I want everyone reading this piece to know that you have all the tools at your disposal to "discover" your own waterfall. The most

primitive method might be to just scramble up random creeks and wait until you finally come across a waterfall. Fortunately, technology has granted us less trial-and-error alternatives. First off, one can often find a waterfall at areas of tightly-pinched elevation contours along creeks on topographic maps. But with the advent of the "Google Earth" software, discovering waterfalls became much easier. Any area of vibrant whitewater you see in the woods on Google Earth satellite imagery is likely to be a waterfall. Finally, the granddaddy of waterfall hunting tools is LiDAR (Light Detection and Ranging), an innovating remote sensing technique that measures distances via laser lights pointed down from aircraft. Thanks to LiDAR, we now have access to remarkable 1-meter topo maps that highlight the tiniest elevation changes and reveal any waterfall, whether it's 100 feet high or 5 feet high. One day, I sat down at my desk and opened Google Earth for a routine satellite imagery scan, when I abruptly stumbled upon an area of vibrant whitewater on Plum Orchard Creek about 10 miles northwest of Clayton. I had not heard of a waterfall on this creek, so I suggested to Bernie that he check it out. This was early 2017. My prior experience with bushwhacking was still meager. The few off-trail waterfalls I did visit before involved closely following the footsteps of those who came before me. However, for once, Bernie was unconvinced that Plum Orchard Creek really contained a waterfall. I was left with no choice but to take matters into my own hands.

On a frosty March morning, I armed myself with a map, compass, and GPS. Cautiously yet eagerly, I took on the challenge of exploring the trackless Plum Orchard Creek valley despite no prior intel. The journey first involved an hour of scrambling up and down steep slopes and through dense rhododendron thickets to reach the creek. Once there, I waded upstream through the creek

for another quarter-mile to the potential waterfall location. My starkest memory from this part of the adventure was repeatedly seeking dry sandbars and rocks to stop my toes from going entirely numb in the cold water! My efforts all paid off when I rounded a corner and gazed upon a monster 65-foot waterfall that I had never seen any photos of. The music of Tchaikovsky's mesmerizing Piano Concerto No. 1 resounded in my head. March 4th, 2017 was the day I discovered my first undocumented waterfall.

After failing to uncover a historical name for the waterfall, I decided to christen it Angelica Falls as a tribute to my mother, who single-handedly instilled a love for both nature and music in me. A concert pianist, my mother had repeatedly emphasized from an early age that both nature and music enrich our spirits and must be a part of everyone's lives. After finding Angelica Falls, I have since rediscovered eight more undocumented waterfalls in Georgia, a number that pales in the shadows of Bernie's and Greg's waterfall discoveries. Yet to date, Angelica



Falls remains one of my favorites in Rabun County, accessible only to seasoned outdoor adventurers with enough experience to attempt the rugged cross-country trek.


So what about the rest of us who aren't avid cross-country bushwhackers? Thankfully, there is no shortage of outstanding waterfalls around Clayton with easier access. Here are a few of my favorites:

- Mud Creek Falls (80 feet). Roadside in Sky Valley, no hike.
- Dicks Creek Falls (50 feet). Easy 0.6-mile trail near Chattooga River.
- Denton Creek Falls. Easy 0.3-mile trail to lower falls (40 feet). Moderate 0.8-mile unofficial path to upper falls (50 feet).
- Haven Falls aka His'n'Her Falls (50 feet). Easy 0.5-mile unofficial trail.
- Moccasin Creek State Park. Easy 1.0-mile trail to

Hemlock Falls (15 feet). Moderate unofficial path with stream crossing continues another 0.7 mile to Upper Moccasin Falls (40 feet).

• Three Forks four-waterfall hike: Thunder Dome Falls, Horsetail Falls, Singley's Falls, and Holcomb Canyon Falls. Moderate to very difficult depending on route. One of the most scenic and pristine watersheds in the state.


Going beyond a concise database, I am currently writing a guidebook titled "Georgia Waterfalls: A Comprehensive Guide". The book will contain detailed, step-bystep directions with maps and full-color photos to ~250 waterfalls across the state, plus brief descriptions of several hundred others. Nearly one-third of the waterfalls will be in Rabun County & vicinity, including many lesser-known waterfalls not found in any other books. I expect to publish the book at some point in 2022. Antiques or Bust

Keep your eyes peeled for roadside discoveries. You'll find great antiquing around pretty much every corner of the county.

When you're seriously in the hunt and intend to keep looking until you find something special, make time to explore Dillard. Travel north from Clayton on Highway 441, and you'll reach Dillard before you know it. Tranquil, calm and on the way to your favorite fun, this mountain town is bustling with cool shops.

You'll find vintage glass, tools, pottery, and collectables. It's also a destination for handmade, antique, and repurposed furniture. If folk art's your jam, then so is Dillard—especially The Dillard Market, which features local favorites Blake Gardner and Scott Peppers. While you're in town, be sure to check for interiors, plus vintage and contemporary Christmas must-haves. And since it's never a bad time to window-shop custom jewelry, let Turpin's Jewelry whet your appetite for silver, gold, gemstones, and Native American pieces.

Take Highway 76 West out of Clayton toward Lake Burton, and you'll find yourself winding through the Timpson Creek area—another must-visit. Alongside the bubbling Timpson Creek, you'll pass a familiar landmark that used to be the Hollifield Store, was later the Log Cabin Store Antiques, and was once even a bait and tackle shop. An in-house design team will help you create the custom look of your dreams. And only a few steps along a delightful garden path you'll find the studio of renowned lake artist Libby Matthews. Above that is Dwayne Thompson's workshop, where the magic behind his creations happens. And while you're exploring the property, don't forget to wander down by the creek. Something familiar and sweet and just right will click, and we're betting you'll make your way back soon to this magical corner of Lake Burton.

Let's "Art Talk" a Little More

You'll find the work of master craftsmen and artists around practically every corner.

Sometimes in thoughtfully curated spaces like Main Street Gallery's bright, colorful, eclectic collection of contemporary folk art. Look for other venues that celebrate an array of local talent. Clayton's Butler Galleries, for example, showcases a variety of artists (including members of the North Georgia Arts Guild) who fill booths with mini collections of their brightest and best. Then there are dedicated spaces, such as Crawford Art Gallery, where the award-winning pieces of a single artist can be admired and purchased.

Not too far out of town you'll pass an indoor flee market on your left that is open weekends, year around. Next, stop at the Rabun Flea Market—an in-season, openair bonanza of local vendors, craftspeople, and hidden treasures. There's even an ice cream shop and Vicki's Restaurant, to help keep kids and adults satisfied while they search.

Did someone say Fairy Gardens? Why, yes, there are fairies around these here parts. And it would be inhospitable not to offer them a special place to sit a spell and enjoy the view.

While you're exploring Rabun Gap, let Billingsley's Garden Center inspire your next whimsical selection. This year-round mainstay never disappoints with their

Old Highway 441 is another favorite shopping byway.

Take it south out of downtown Clayton, wind through the communities of Tiger and Wiley, and it feels as if you're motoring back in time. Before you know it, you've arrived at historic Lakemont Village and its charming taste of what lake life must have been like, "once upon a time."


Situated along the Tallulah River as it gently curls toward the gorge, just minutes from Lake Rabun, newly revitalized Lakemont is upbeat, in an old-world way. Its renovated and restored, early-1900s buildings house a hub of creativity. Give yourself a morning or an afternoon to experience this one-time stop on the Tallulah Falls Railroad—especially on weekends, when all the shops are open.

Grab a nostalgic bite to eat at The Open Door at Alley's Ol' Store, a mom-and-pop market and deli that offers scrumptious sandwiches, salads, soups, and other lake favorites, plus a boutique selection of wine, beer, and cigars. Spring and fall seasonal tours highlight locally-owned farms. Plus, there's a bounty of roadside stands and markets to flavor-up your shopping experience.

The Clayton Famer's Market is an in-season, Saturday morning destination. Revel in the freshest local produce, cheeses, eggs, meat and poultry, prepared foods, crafts, and beverages.

No doubt you've driven past Osage Farms Produce Market (and likely noticed the crowds of people swarming about during the heat of the summer rush). This Rabun Gap mainstay (just past Mountain City) takes pride in offering an unparalleled selection of home-grown fruits and vegetables. Visit and watch locals haul away bushels

of corn, peaches, and tomatoes, destined to be canned and to become ingredients for mouthwatering winter meals. Don't miss the gift and garden options, too: jams, jellies, flowers, freshly made breads and baked goods, as well as fresh eggs, cheese, cured meats, and locally farmed and milled grains and flour.

And speaking of local farm destinations... Before you leave the area, detour into Wolffolk Valley and discover Sylvan Falls Mill (on Taylor's Chapel Rd.). This 1840s grist mill, powered by a twenty-seven-foot water wheel, produces stone-ground grains you can purchase on site, as well as from vendors all about Rabun County. In the mill store, look for organic white and blue grits and corn meal, cornbread mix, and wheat, rye, spelt and 7 grain flour. If you've eaten at Clayton hotspots like Fortify and Fortify Pi, you've already sampled food created from Sylvan Falls Mill's bounty. The mill owner also bakes pastries, breads, muffins and other goodies that are sold via area markets, such as Northeast Georgia Locally Grown.

On the Tiger/Wiley side of town (south on Old Highway 441) there's Hillside Orchard Farms, a great stop for family fun and mountain-themed shopping. Visit their barnyard and resident critters, take a train or hayride, pick seasonal fruits (including blueberries, apples, and pumpkins), mine for gems, and so much more. They, too, offer outstanding hostess and gift-basket selections such as jams, jellies, pickles, and other canned goodness.

Find the Blueridge Honey Company next. They're known for an impressive variety of honey, plus bees and bee supplies. And while you're there, check out their beethemed home, bath and body, and other gift items—for adults AND kids. There are candles, tea accessories, creams and lotions, kitchen linens, books, games, stationary, and T-shirts. Plus a veritable wall of canned jellies, jams, pickles, and sauces to choose from.

And, last but not least, make it to Julep Farms. This freshon-the-scene venue has absolutely cornered the market for offering an all-around mountain farm, shopping, and fine dining experience. At once elegant and rustic, this destination just north of Dillard's downtown is a mustvisit, whether you want to explore the twenty-two-acre property, spend quality family time outdoors, or eat a gloriously fresh lunch, Sunday brunch, or dinner. To bring a touch of the farm experience home with you, shop the elegantly appointed retail space, which includes a coffee and pastry bar. Or, how about staying overnight in one of their quaint cottages? If relaxing in a serene



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mountain valley sounds like a slice of heaven to you, most definitely give this destination a try.



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Foxfire

Preserving the Past for Future Generations

Nestled on the side of Black Rock Mountain, the Foxfire Museum encompasses over 100 acres, eight of which have been developed into a campus of historic buildings representing Appalachian culture and traditions. Unlike most museums organized by historical societies, the Foxfire Museum was an outgrowth of local high schoolers' work in their community.

In 1966, English students at Rabun Gap-Nacoochee School decided to create a literary magazine in lieu of studying such classics as Shakespeare. The very first Foxfire magazine—named for the glowing fungus found on damp summer nights in the mountains—was published in 1967. Among the poetry and prose from local students and authors, the magazine also featured interviews with elderly relatives and neighbors who were born in the late 19th century. These oral histories quickly became the star of the magazine, and from these interviews came dozens of books and hundreds of articles across decades of publication.

As Foxfire students continued to interview people, they began to collect objects and artifacts from those

visits. A morning with Bill Lamb left the students with a stack of hand-split During an afternoon with shingles. Beulah Perry, the students wove their very own white oak hamper. In just a day with Buck Carver, the students even helped build a full-scale replica moonshine still. While the students were making and collecting these artifacts and memories, The Foxfire Book was experiencing global success. The book soon generated enough royalty money that Foxfire students could purchase the property in Mountain City, where the museum now resides. As with all things Foxfire, the students made the choice to convert this old orchard into

a cultural center for future students and their community. In need of spaces to house their artifacts and classes, the students decided to save historic structures and rebuild them on site at the museum.

The first building purchased and reconstructed at Foxfire was the Bell Grist Mill, which originally sat near Arie Carpenter's home in Macon County, North Carolina. Built in the late 1920s, this complete mill is the most iconic structure at Foxfire. Shortly after its relocation in 1974, the students hired community members to help fulfill their dreams of relocating, rebuilding, and renovating log buildings in the region. Within just a few short years, the students and their adult supervisors moved over 20 buildings to the property. These were used as classroom spaces, teacher housing, magazine offices, archives, and exhibits—exclusively by Foxfire students and staff until the early 2000s when the museum formally opened to the public.

The museum continues its educational mission through special programming for K-12 students and an immersive summer leadership program for Rabun County high schoolers. In addition to guided tours of the museum, Foxfire offers a diversity of online activities and experiences for students both






near and far, including videos, lesson plans, and virtual tours.

Today, the museum is an engaging and interactive space for all who visit. On any day of the week, visitors can take a self-guided tour, following a half-mile walking path and exploring the buildings with the aid of a (free!) mobile app. The tour leads visitors through an 1820s homestead, exhibits on special crafts like woodworking and quilting, and a powerful display on the Cherokee removal. Step back in time and watch weavers, blacksmiths, and a broom maker practice their crafts in traditional Appalachian-fashion. **Explore** the many different forms of Appalachian folk art, from toys to pottery and baskets. Listen to the wondrous hymns sung by shape-note groups as you









approach the peaceful mountain chapel. Finish off your visit with a quick stop in our museum store, which proudly sells not only every Foxfire book ever published, but a multitude of goods handcrafted by local artisans, such as handwoven blankets and towels, old-fashioned lye soap, and one-of-a-kind folk pottery from the region.

Every fall, on the first Saturday of October, Foxfire hosts the Foxfire Mountaineer Festival—a one-day celebration of the rich traditions of Southern Appalachia, featuring music from regional performers and demonstrations of historic crafts, such as blacksmithing, woodworking, soap making, and more. This family-friendly event includes all manner of traditional games and puzzles for young and old alike, from sack races to a cross-cut sawing competition. The Festival honors the people of Southern Appalachia, represented at the event by some of the very individuals who have allowed their stories to be shared with the world through the pages of The Foxfire Magazine and The Foxfire Book series. Regular admission is \$5 per person with children 5 and under free. All proceeds go to Foxfire and are critical to supporting our mission of preserving and sharing the culture of the mountains.

The Foxfire Museum has so much to offer, but never strays from its core mission of supporting its community and celebrating the rich history and

heritage of Southern Appalachia. Listen to oral histories straight from the pages of The Foxfire Book on the museum's podcast, "It Still Lives," available on any podcasting platform or the Foxfire website. Support the preservation of mountain culture and community education by donating to the museum, purchasing a museum membership, or subscribing to the student-produced Foxfire magazine!
